Build a fort of blankets. Read inside.

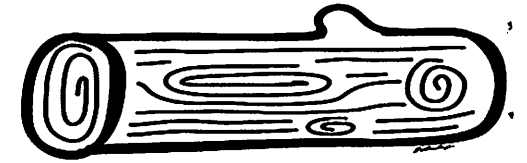
Read a book while you are waiting for someone.
